



CHECKLIST TO STOP ZEB


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

DESIGN YOUR OWN INVASIVE MUSSEL



MEET ZEB

Zeb is a Zebra Mussel. He is in the mollusk family, which means he is related to clams, snails and slugs.



He and his closely related cousin, Quagga Mussel, were accidentally brought to Canada's Great Lakes region in the 1980s. They came from Europe and Asia as stowaways in the ballast water of large ships. Since then, they have hitched rides on boats and trailers right across the United States. But they **DO NOT** live in BC and they are not wanted here. Zebra and Quagga Mussels are **INVASIVE**.

What are Invasive Mussels?


Non-native. Invasive mussels come from other places in the world (Zebra and Quagga Mussels were introduced from Eastern Europe and Asia).

Adult mussels have a pair of triangular shells connected by an elastic hinge. The outside of the shells are usually brown with stripes, which is how the Zebra Mussel got its name.

They are small mussels, growing to about 5cm maximum length. They have small threads that help them attach to anything that is in the water – a boat, anchor, rocks, docks or piers.

What do Invasive Mussels do?

Affect outdoor fun. When Zebra and Quagga Mussels die, their shells wash up on beaches and are very sharp. People can no longer walk on the sand in bare feet. They can also clog boat motors.

Unwanted. Invasive mussels are bullies and compete with some of our native fish for food. They also clog water intake pipes that collect our drinking water.


Lack natural enemies. There is nothing in BC that would eat invasive mussels and keep them under control. If they ever arrive, they are likely here to stay.

Quick Review

An **ADJECTIVE** describes something or somebody. Lumpy, soft, ugly, messy, and short are adjective.

When we ask for a **PLACE**, we mean any sort of place : a country or city (Canada, Penticton) or a room (bathroom, kitchen).

An **ADVERB** tells how something is done. It modifies a verb and usually ends in "ly." Modestly, stupidly, greedily, and carefully are adverbs.

An **EXCLAMATION** or **SILLY WORD** is any sort of funny sound, gasp, grunt, or outcry, like Wow!, Ouch!, Ick!, and Gadzooks!.

A **NOUN** is the name of a person, place, or thing. Sidewalk, umbrella, toy, bathtub, and nose are nouns.


When we ask for a **PLURAL**, it means more than one. For example, door pluralized is doors.

A **VERB** is an action word. Run, pitch, jump, and swim are verbs. Put the verbs in past tense if the directions say

PAST TENSE. Ran, pitched, jumped, and swam are verbs in the past tense.

When we ask for specific words like a **NUMBER**, a **COLOR**, an **ANIMAL**, or a **PART OF THE BODY**, we mean a word that is one of those things, like seven, green, dog, or mouth.


Zeb the Zebra Mussel's Crazy Vacation

Freaky and Funky Facts:

- A female Zebra Mussel can produce up to 1,000,000 eggs in one year!
- The tiny eggs quickly develop into free-swimming larvae called veligers (VEL-i-jers). Veligers are smaller than a grain of sand.
- When Zebra Mussels are first born they are so small that 12,000 can fit on a pencil eraser.
- At 3 - 4 weeks, the veligers' shells weigh enough to cause them to sink. They must find something to attach to or they will die.
- Zebra Mussels can filter about 1 litre of water each day.
- Zebra Mussels can live without food for ONE year.
